From the CEO

2021 was a year that was marked by great trial as Colquitt Regional continued to work through challenges of the lingering COVID-19 pandemic. However, 2022 was a year that we turned the page and we began to move forward, leaving the pandemic in our rearview mirror, albeit cautiously.

This year, our health system experienced tremendous growth. We welcomed 60 new employees and onboarded 10 new providers to increase access to care for our community members. One of our biggest accomplishments was the acquisition of a skilled nursing facility in March. The 59-bed skilled nursing center provides care in clinical and skilled nursing, inpatient physical and occupational therapies, and other specialized programs. Formerly Cobblestone Rehabilitation, the facility is now known as Colquitt Regional Senior Care & Rehabilitation and we look forward to continuing to care for our patients in this capacity, providing them a caring, warm atmosphere while having access to expert therapists, nurses, and providers.

Throughout the year we also added several new, state-of-the-art technologies, such as the GE MyoSPECT, a type of single-photon emission computerized tomography (SPECT), making us the first hospital in the state to acquire the device and will greatly benefit patients at the Hufstetler Heart Center. In June, the hospital cut the ribbon on its new Geropsychiatry Inpatient Behavioral Health Unit (BHU). The focus of this new service line is to provide short-term intensive treatment for elderly patients who suffer from acute psychiatric disorders, cognitive impairment, and age-related physiological disabilities. In further expansion of the psychiatric services offered within the Colquitt Regional healthcare system, Georgia South Psychiatry Residency Program, which received full accreditation in February, welcomed its first class of residents at our annual new resident celebration in June.

With the frequent addition of new units and departments outgrowing capacity, open space is very limited with the walls of the hospital. As this issue was brought to light several years ago, the administrative team and Colquitt County Hospital Authority

members began to explore opportunities for further expansion. A new education services facility was proposed during those discussions and plans have been in motion ever since. This new two-story facility will boast over 39,000 sq. ft. of space. We were proud to break ground on the new Ameris Medical Education Building in September 2022. The projected opening date is fall 2023.

As Colquitt Regional continues to grow, patient care will always remain the top priority for hospital administration and employees. This commitment was recognized in November 2022 as the hospital received its 15th 'A' Hospital Safety Score from The Leapfrog Group. This is a national distinction recognizing the hospital's achievements in protecting patients from errors, injuries, accidents, and infections.

Looking forward, Colquitt Regional will soon be opening a brand-new pediatrics unit on the fourth floor of the hospital. This is the next step in the process of expanding its pediatrics program. The six-bed unit will include fully-renovated, private rooms, spacious furniture to allow for overnight family stays, entertainment devices such as smart TVs and XBOX gaming systems. The hospital anticipates opening this unit in March 2023.

As always, we are proud to be part of the Colquitt County community. This progress would not be possible without the support of every patient, donor, employee, and advocate for our health system.




Looking Ahead



Colquitt Regional Adds Skilled Nursing to it's Roster



Colquitt Regional Medical Center announced in February 2022 its plans to acquire Cobblestone Rehabilitation and Healthcare Center from Gulf Coast Health Care. The purchase of the skilled nursing facility finalized on March 1, 2022 and is now known as Colquitt Regional Senior Care and Rehabilitation.

"Acquiring Cobblestone has allowed us to expand our continuum of care and provide additional services to our patients and this community," said Colquitt Regional Medical Center President and CEO Jim Matney. "It has been a long-term goal of ours to expand into skilled nursing, so it was the perfect opportunity for us to begin this journey."

The 59-bed skilled nursing center provides care in clinical and skilled nursing, inpatient physical and occupational therapies, and other specialized programs. Patients requiring clinical and skilled nursing care are offered a wide variety of services, such as IV therapy, wound care, post-surgical care, short-term rehabilitation, and long-term, respite, hospice, and palliative care.

Physical, occupational, and/or speech therapies are also available to patients, including post-stroke rehab, gait training, pain management, contracture management, cognitive training, swallowing impairments, and post-operative rehab for knee, shoulder, hip, back, etc., among others.

Colquitt Regional Medical Center has well-established rehabilitation therapy programs through the Vereen Center and will partner with the Vereen team to deliver care to patients at the new facility.

"Many of these are services we already offer at Colquitt Regional, so we are excited to embark on this new venture and offer a continuation of the same care in a skilled nursing facility," said Hospital Authority Chairman Richard E. Turner, Jr.

The hospital has made significant upgrades to the facility in the since acquiring the facility. The whole building has been freshly painted, new décor has been added, such as window treatments and bedroom furniture, the activity room received new floors, and all rooms have new, state-of the art beds.

"The patients that rely on this facility to provide nursing and rehab care deserve the same exceptional experience that they receive at other Colquitt Regional locations," said Matney. The addition of Colquitt Regional Senior Care and Rehabilitation will extend the Colquitt Regional Medical Center continuum of care for seniors in particular, which has been a focus of the organization over the past few years.

Patient volume has continued to increase for Colquitt Regional Home Care Services, which includes Home Health, Palliative Care, Hospice and Private Duty services.

"We recognize the growing need for all levels of care for those aging in our community," said Turner. "We want to do our part to make sure we provide a full spectrum of high-quality healthcare to patients in the home setting, at a skilled nursing facility, or within the walls of Colquitt Regional Medical Center."

One of the next steps for growth would be the establishment of a geriatric track within the Georgia South Family Medicine Residency Program. Adding a skilled nursing facility to Colquitt Regional Medical Center will allow for additional training opportunities with geriatric patients for resident physicians.

Colquitt Regional is First in State to Offer MyoSPECT Cardiology Technology

Colquitt Regional announced in May 2022 the addition of the GE MyoSPECT to the Hufstetler Heart Center, making it the first hospital in the state to introduce this machine. The MyoSPECT is a type of single-photon emission computerized tomography (SPECT) device that is brand new in its field.

The MyoSPECT, which was installed in early April, is designed to view cardiac anatomy and pathology with great clarity, exceptional patient comfort, and provide clinicians with the information they need to help improve patient outcomes. Compared to previously-utilized technology, this device offers a wider table and a 76 percent increase in field-of-view volume, providing clinicians greater positioning flexibility. Patients who have traditionally been too weak to sit up through an entire exam or others with high body mass indexes (BMIs) will be able to utilize this new machine.

In addition to now being able to serve an increased patient base, this technology also provides a more complete picture of the heart's anatomy and pathology by using nine camera heads. Most SPECT devices only use six. Patients will also experience shorter scan times and increased comfort with Smart Positioning, which offers positioning prompts and recommendations to optimize the patient's comfort level.

"We have worked strategically to stay on the cutting edge of technology and practices and have implemented four major pieces of equipment in the last year," said Colquitt Regional President and CEO Jim Matney. "To be the first hospital in the state of Georgia to introduce the MyoSPECT is a great accomplishment for our team and a huge win for our patients. This further displays our commitment to bringing top-of-the-line, modern healthcare machinery right to our patients' backyards."

Patients who are referred to the MyoSPECT will first have a nuclear stress test completed, where the patient will have their heart scanned and blood flow measured while they are at rest and after physical exertion, showing areas with poor blood flow and/or heart damage.

When the patient arrives, a technician will insert an intravenous (IV) line into the arm and inject a radioactive dye. They will be scanned with the MyoSPECT to acquire baseline images while the heart is at rest. Once rest images are completed, the patient is transferred to the stress area to be connected to an electrocardiogram (EKG) and blood pressure machine. An exercise stress test is then conducted, where the patient walks on a treadmill, slowly first, then increasing difficulty and speed throughout the test.

The patient is injected with another round of radioactive dye when the heart rate peaks. After about 20-40 minutes, they will lie still on a table and have a second set of images made of the heart muscle.

The radioactive dye will show any areas of the heart receiving inadequate blood flow. Results are then sent to the referring physician and a treatment plan, if needed, will be discussed with the patient.

"According to the CDC, one in every four deaths in the United States is directly related to heart disease," said Hospital Authority Chairman Richard E. Turner, Jr. "With the prevalence of heart-related health issues continuing to increase, we understand the urgency in ensuring that our patients have timely access to he most up-to-date technology available in the cardiovascular sphere."

Colquitt Regional Cuts Ribbon on Behavioral Health Unit

Colquitt Regional Medical Center cut the ribbon on its new Geropsychiatry Inpatient Behavioral Health Unit (BHU) in June 2022. The focus of this new service line is to provide short-term intensive treatment for elderly patients who suffer from acute psychiatric disorders, cognitive impairment, and age-related physiological disabilities.

Patients who are admitted benefit from a comprehensive line of treatments offered in the BHU, such as extensive evaluation and assessment, individual treatment planning, individual and family therapy, group therapy (occupational and activity), medication management, discharge planning, outreach and referral for aftercare, and family and caregiver support.

The unit, which is located on the second floor of the hospital, houses 10 beds, four semi-private and two private. It will largely serve the 55+ population and aims to help patients regain and maintain their optimal level of health. More specifically, this unit will benefit patients who suffer from depression, anxiety, grief, coping challenges, or emotional disturbances.

"Over the past several years, it has become evident that this service is greatly needed for our community," said Colquitt Regional President and CEO Jim Matney. "Until now, patients with geriatric psychiatry needs had to transfer to neighboring facilities to receive the necessary level of care. Now, patients in our community have the option to stay right here in their hometown and still receive the same exceptional care."

The dire need for increased access to mental health services in rural areas, coupled with increasing numbers of the geriatric population have been major driving forces for the implementation of these services. According to the National Institutes of Health, the 65+ population is projected to almost double by 2050, growing from 48 million to 88 million.

This new unit is only one of several recent additions to Colquitt Regional's psychiatry services. In 2020, Sterling Physician Group added its first psychiatrist, Dr. Teron Verma, to its medical staff. In 2021, the hospital opened an intensive outpatient program, Sterling Group Senior Wellness, that focuses on providing treatment in a group setting to adults who are experiencing depression, anxiety, and emotional problems, among others. On June 14, Georgia South Graduate Medical Education welcomed its first set of psychiatry residents and will train them to become independent psychiatrists over the next four years, in hopes of creating a new pipeline of mental health physicians for the region.

"We are constantly evaluating our services and how we can continue meeting the needs of our patients and community members," said Hospital Authority Chairman Richard E. Turner, Jr. "With the addition of these psychiatric service lines, we are able to provide a greater continuum

of care, ranging from acute inpatient care and intensive outpatient treatment to follow-ups with Dr. Verma and his staff."





Colquitt Regional's BHU is led by Sterling Physician Group psychiatrist Lisa Rudolph-Watson, MD, who serves as medical director, and Director of Behavior Health Melissia Bennett, MSN, RN.

The BHU was made possible through the support of 2021 Georgia HEART tax credit donations and several signature naming donations to Colquitt Regional Medical Foundation. This includes a donation of \$250,000 by Colquitt Regional employees, a \$110,000 gift by the Colquitt Regional Volunteers, and a generous donation of \$25,000 by Mr. and Mrs. Victor Beadles.

Melton Celebrates 1,000th Robtic Surgery

Colquitt Regional Medical Center's senior surgeon Dr. Howard Melton celebrated a major milestone this year. On July 31, Melton was recognized for his 1,000th surgery using the da Vinci Surgical System. Having completed over 1,000 robotic surgeries, Melton joins a small group of surgeons in Georgia to reach this achievement.

The da Vinci Surgical System is a sophisticated robotic platform designed to expand a surgeon's capabilities and offer a state-of-the-art, minimally-invasive option for major surgeries. The device, operated by the surgeon, utilizes small incisions to insert miniaturized instruments and a high-definition 3D camera into the body. The surgical system is then able to filter and seamlessly translate the surgeon's movements into precise micro-movements through the da Vinci's arms, which improves range of motion, dexterity, and overall surgical precision.

The da Vinci robot is utilized during a number of routine and elective procedures such as treatment of cancers, removals of organs, abscesses, blockages, ruptures, and bariatric surgeries.

"Dr. Melton is a leader in our surgical department and a huge asset to our team at Colquitt Regional and Sterling Physician Group," said Colquitt Regional Medical Center President and CEO Jim Matney. "He has touched thousands of lives in this community and we are so grateful to him for the compassionate, expert care he delivers every day to our patients."

Originally from Valdosta, Melton attended the Medical College of Georgia where he received his medical degree. He then went on to complete a surgical residency at Methodist University Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee.

Melton first crossed paths with Colquitt Regional Medical Center in July 1985 when he completed his first clinical rotation in the hospital with Dr. Lanny Copeland. Little did he know that he would return to Colquitt Regional in 1996 and spend the majority of his career, over 26 years, in Moultrie.

"I am fortunate that my medical career brought me to Moultrie and Colquitt Regional," said Melton. "I couldn't ask for a better place to practice medicine, raise a family, and build a life. I love Moultrie and it has been good to me and my family. Colquitt Regional has been my second home. I have spent countless hours here in this hospital and have been able to develop relationships with thousands of patients through the years. Thank you to each person for trusting me with your care."

During his time at Colquitt Regional, he has served as chief of staff, chief of surgery, and is currently serving on the Hospital Authority of Colquitt County. He also has served as Governor-at-Large on the Board of Governors of the American College of Surgeons and president of the Georgia Society of the American College of Surgeons for the last two years.

Further indicating Melton's expertise, he recently presented at the Georgia American Society for Metabolic and Bariatric Surgery meeting, where he discussed the endoscopic sleeve gastrectomy, one of Sterling Center Bariatrics' most popular procedures.

"Dr. Melton is truly deemed an expert in his field, especially when it comes to the da Vinci, and has mentored many medical learners," said Hospital Authority Chairman Richard E. Turner, Jr. "He has passion for his patients, years of experience and exceptional proficiency in his field. We are blessed that he has chosen Colquitt Regional to call home for so many years."

In addition to his 1,000th robotic surgery, Melton also has another reason to celebrate. His daughter, Dr. Dresden Melton Soderstrom, is finishing up her surgical training at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and will be joining Sterling Physician Group in the summer of 2023.

Georgia South Family Medicine Residency Program was established in 2016 as a way for the hospital to address physician shortages in underserved areas, particularly in South Georgia. Since the inception of the program, Colquitt Regional has continued its commitment to finding physicians with a passion for serving rural communities. Similarly, in 2019, the hospital saw a need for mental healthcare professionals in the region and embarked on a journey to establish a psychiatry residency program.

"When it comes to services at Colquitt Regional, when we see a need, our goal is to do whatever we can to fill that need for our patients and community members," said Colquitt Regional President and CEO Jim Matney. "When it became evident that our region was in desperate need of mental healthcare physicians, we wasted no time and started building a new program from the ground. Our hope is that through this psychiatry residency, we will make a lasting impact on the mental health of this region for years to come."

The inaugural class of psychiatry residents include Anthony Cimmino, MD, Xuan Ouyang, DO, and Richard Tricardo, MD.

Cimmino, a native of Ocean, New Jersey, attended medical school at Trinity School of Medicine. Prior to medical school, he obtained his master of business administration degree from Walden University and received his bachelor of arts degree in communications from Ramapo College of New Jersey.

Ouyang, originally from Birmingham, Alabama, received his medical degree from the Alabama College of Osteopathic Medicine. He also attended Lincoln Memorial University, where he obtained his master of science degree in biomedical professions, and the University of Michigan, where he earned his bachelor of science degree in biology.

Tricardo, who hails from New York, attended medical school at St. George's University School of Medicine. Prior to medical school, he also earned a law degree from St. John's University School of Law, and a bachelor of arts degree in economics from New York University.

"It is a privilege to help build a program that values its residents and is deeply committed to providing the best learning and training possible," said Georgia South Psychiatry Residency Program Director Lisa Rudolph-Watson, MD. "Much like the first class of family medicine residents, the inaugural group of psychiatry residents have entrusted us with the next four years of their medical education, and we are honored that they chose us. Moultrie has proven to be a community that values partnership and collaboration. While Colquitt Regional will be home to these residents, they will

benefit from gaining a wide range of clinical experience from mental health facilities such as Turning Point Hospital, Georgia Pines, and Vandemark Psychiatry and Counseling."

The incoming family medicine residents include Monica Drummond, DO, Charles Haddad, MD, Montavious McKenzie, MD, and Bayan Suleiman, MD.

Drummond, originally from North Point, Florida, attended Campbell University Jerry M. Wallace School of Osteopathic Medicine. Prior to medical school, she obtained her master of healthcare sciences degree in biomedical science from Liberty University and a bachelor of science degree in psychology from the University of South Florida.

Haddad, a Jacksonville, Florida native, received his medical degree from St. George's University School of Medicine. Before medical school, he attended Florida State University where he earned a bachelor of science degree in biology.

McKenzie, who grew up just down the road in Albany, Georgia, attended medical school at American University of the Caribbean School of Medicine. He also attended Albany State University, where he obtained his master of education degree in science education, and Valdosta State University, where he earned his bachelor of science degree in biology/ chemistry.

Suleiman, who hails from The Bronx, New York, attended medical school at Trinity School of Medicine. Prior to medical school, she also attended The George Washington University Milkin Institute of Public Health, where she obtained her master of public health degree, and the University of Vermont, where she earned her bachelor of arts degree in mathematics.

Following tradition, each resident received a new white coat at the ceremony. This year's coats were presented by Watson, Georgia South Family Medicine Program Director Kirby Smith, D.O., and Chief Academic Officer Woodwin Weeks, D.O.

Onward and Upward

Expanding Access to Graduate Medical Education for Generations to Come

Colquitt Regional held a ground breaking for its new medical education building in the fall of 2022. Members of the Colquitt County Hospital Authority, Colquitt Regional hospital administration, Colquitt Regional Foundation board, faculty of Georgia South Graduate Medical Education, and representatives of Ameris Bank gathered on Monday, September 26, for a ceremony to celebrate the addition.

The new two-story facility will boast over 39,000 sq. ft. of space and will be located on the north side of the Colquitt Regional campus, behind Vereen Rehabilitation Center. The first floor will house the Colquitt Regional Educational Services department. The second floor will be home to Georgia South Family Medicine Residency Program and clinic, Georgia South Psychiatry Residency Program and future clinic, and offices for affiliated physicians, faculty, and staff.

"Providing quality medical education is vital to training, recruiting, and retaining physicians," said Colquitt Regional President and CEO Jim Matney. "Over the past year, Colquitt Regional has acquired state-of-the-art simulation equipment that will be housed in the new medical education building once it is open. Through this new education center, we will be providing high-caliber training opportunities for medical learners not only at our hospital, but other institutions as well."

The plans also include four simulation rooms, a computer lab, classroom space, an auditorium, and a skills lab for students and staff to practice clinical procedures in a learning environment.

Each simulation room will be devoted to one of the following disciplines: labor and delivery, medical/surgical, intensive care, and trauma. They will mimic Colquitt Regional's hospital rooms to allow for training that is as close to a real-life scenario as possible. Each room will have a high-

fidelity manikin that can be programmed to respond to the learning environment to train providers in best practices and events.

The education building will be utilized by a number of medical learners including physicians, nurses, paramedics, and nurse assistants. Georgia South residents, in particular, will greatly benefit from having hands-on learning experiences within these new, high-tech environments.

Georgia South Family Medicine Residency Program was first established in 2016 to meet the growing need for family medicine physicians in the region and has graduated 13 resident physicians to-date. Georgia South Psychiatry Residency Program welcomed its first class in July 2022.

"As we continue to grow our medical education programs, we want to provide our residents with the resources they need for success," said Matney. "This new facility will not only provide those resources for them, but will immerse them into a culture of continuing education, which will allow them to sharpen their skillset and hone their expertise."

In 2018, Colquitt Regional graciously accepted a \$2 million pledge from Ameris Bank. This pledge, which was paid through the Georgia HEART rural tax credit program, will largely go towards the construction of the facility. The building will be named Ameris Bank Medical Educational Building in honor of the generous contributions from Ameris.

"We applaud the vision of Colquitt Regional Medical Center to advance medical education and service in Moultrie, which is where Ameris Bank was founded 51 years ago," said Ameris Bank and Ameris Bancorp CEO H. Palmer Proctor, Jr. "With these deep roots and our ongoing commitment to Moultrie, we are proud to see the contribution from Ameris used to build a facility that we know will support the community for many years to come."

The Georgia HEART rural tax program allows Georgia residents to reallocate their state tax dollars to qualified rural hospital organizations. With funds through Georgia HEART, Colquitt Regional has been able to make facility infrastructure upgrades and service line additions, such as the renovation and expansion of the Edwards Cancer Center and its radiation oncology unit. It is anticipated the majority of the funds received through Georgia HEART next year will aid in the construction of the new education building.

Colquitt Regional's Ameris Bank Medical Education Building is projected to open in Summer 2023.

"Over the past six years, we have seen tremendous growth in medical education, and a large share of that is due to our community partnerships," said Hospital Authority Chairman Richard E. Turner, Jr. "With the support of partners like Ameris Bank, we have been able to bring countless services and physicians to Colquitt Regional and establish two residency programs. Our collective goal is to create a steady pipeline of well-equipped, competent medical professionals for our health system and the region, which, ultimately, provides increased access to care for our patients and communities."

Colquitt Regional Awarded 15th 'A' Hospital Safety Grade

Colquitt Regional Medical Center received its 15th "A" Hospital Safety Grade from The Leapfrog Group, in the Fall of 2022. This is a national distinction recognizing the hospital's achievements in protecting patients from errors, injuries, accidents, and infections.

The Leapfrog Group is an independent national watchdog organization with a 10-year history of assigning letter grades to general hospitals throughout the United States, based on a hospital's ability to prevent medical errors and harm to patients. The grading system is peer-reviewed, fully transparent, and free to the public. Hospital Safety Grade results are based on more than 30 national performance measures and are updated each fall and spring.

"Our hospital has built a culture where patient safety is at the core of each patient interaction," said Colquitt Regional President and CEO Jim Matney. "From trainings and educational opportunities to daily team huddles, we are ensuring that our employees have the necessary resources and procedures put in place to continue delivering the safest care possible. This recognition is highly commendable and I am proud of each employee for the invaluable role they have played in this accomplishment."

Among the 30 measures used to evaluate each hospital, Colquitt Regional earned a perfect score in the following categories: computerized physician order entry, bar code medication administration, ICU physician staffing, culture of leadership structures and systems, culture measurement, feedback and intervention, nursing workforce, and hand hygiene.

"I applaud the hospital leadership and workforce for their strong commitment to safety and transparency," said The Leapfrog Group President and CEO Leah Binder. "An 'A' Safety Grade is a sign that hospitals are continuously evaluating their performance, so that they can best protect patients. The hospital team should be extremely proud of their dedication and achievement."

Colquitt Regional also scored 91 percent or higher in the categories of nurse communication and doctor communication. "Receiving an 'A' is no small task, especially when your team has done it 15 times," said Hospital Authority Chairman Richard E. Turner, Jr. "Both the administration and employees of Colquitt Regional have worked together to earn these 15 'A's and create a health system where patients know they will be treated with safe care from the moment they enter our facility." Colquitt Regional was awarded its 'A' grade on November 16, when Leapfrog announced grades for the fall 2022 update. Colquitt Regional Earns Stroke Designation

Colquitt Regional Medical Center was designated a Remote Treatment Stroke Center by the Georgia Department of Public Health (DPH) in 2022.

Colquitt Regional has been working to obtain this designation for several years. The process included keeping track of each patient diagnosed with a stroke and reporting specific data to the state as well as the American Heart Association.

The data collected involved door-to-head CT scan times, Altephase (clot buster medication) administration, antithrombotic and anticoagulant administration, treatment for high cholesterol, smoking cessation education, consideration for rehabilitation therapy, and stroke education at discharge, among other data points. Not only was the data collected and reported, but it was used to improve processes within the hospital through performance improvement and patient safety projects.

In addition to reporting and collecting data, surveyors from the GADPH, Georgia Office of EMS/Trauma, and the American Heart Association, made a site visit to Colquitt Regional to ensure that all criteria was met.

"Our patients and employees now have 24/7 access to stroke specialists," said Colquitt Regional President and CEO Jim Matney. "The Colquitt Regional Stroke Team has been on a journey over the last several years to build on existing stroke procedures. We have received awards from the American Heart Association for three consecutive years for our stroke and diabetes efforts. This new designation signifies that Colquitt Regional continues to deliver on its commitment to bring safe, compassionate, and timely care to its patient base."

Colquitt Regional takes a multi-disciplinary approach to treat stroke patients, which involves various departments ranging from the emergency department and diagnostic imaging, to emergency medical services and the intensive care unit.

When a patient presents with stroke symptoms, hospital healthcare professionals are able to share patient data and information with trained specialists and receive care directives and treatment protocols via partnership with a higher-level stroke center. This new level of care ensures that the hospital is able to assess and diagnose the patient in a timely manner.

Knowing the signs and symptoms of stroke and acting fast are two of the major ways that a patient can minimize the damage done by stroke. Colquitt Regional promotes the "B.E.F.A.S.T." method to recognize that a stroke is occurring.

B - Balance: Watch for sudden loss of balance

E - Eyes: Check for vision loss

F - Face: Look for an uneven smile

A - Arm: Check if one arm/leg is weak or numb

S - Speech: Listen for slurred speech or inability to speak

T - Time: Call 911 right away

"Treating patients with a suspected stroke quickly and efficiently is imperative," said Hospital Authority Chairman Richard E. Turner, Jr. "I commend this team for their efforts in bringing a higher level of care to Colquitt Regional, one that will benefit many patients who come through our doors."




